



Started in 1984, The Wildlife Care Clinic (WCC) is a 501© (3) non-profit organization staffed by undergraduate students of Iowa State University in Ames, Iowa, and our overseeing veterinarian, Bianca Zaffarano. Our primary mission is to provide medical attention, rehabilitation, and facilities for injured or orphaned wildlife. We aim to educate the public on the importance of Iowa's and the Midwest's, native wildlife and environment. We aim to place non-releasable wildlife with other licensed wildlife professionals for education and housing purposes. Our funding comes solely from donations from the public through various fundraising activities held by the clinic.

Currently, there are four permanent residents who reside at the clinic: two owls and two hawks, all of whom we use for our educational programs.

The staff loves to see all the wildlife that comes through the clinic. Nothing is greater than rehabilitating something in need of help, and releasing back into the wild where it belongs. We accept all wildlife species with the exception of skunks and raccoons, for safety reasons. As such, we never know what we are going to get through the clinic. We've seen eagles, swans, bobcats, great blue herons, and many other fascinating species. It's never a dull day at the WCC.
